SUBJECT: Canine Sub-Group Recommendation—Pre-Mission Veterinary Exam

Guidelines

(Tactical)

The following is a request pursuant to a Canine Sub-Group recommendation as approved by the Search Working Group:

ISSUE STATEMENT

■ FEMA National US&R Response System canines do not have access to a standardized pre-mission hands-on veterinary exam.

GENERAL BACKGROUND

Currently, Task Forces do not have access to a standardized pre-mission veterinary exam to help ensure that canines selected for deployment are healthy. Task Forces could unknowingly deploy with injured, sick, and/or infectious canines that may affect the health and safety of Task Force members and/or other Task Force canines.

RECOMMENDATION

The CSG, through the SWG, recommends that US&R Task Force canines selected for deployment be provided a standardized hands-on veterinary exam (Attachment A). The exam should be conducted by a licensed DVM no more than 10 days prior to a deployment and include documentation which attests that the canine appears free of infectious disease or physical abnormality that would endanger the animal, other animals or the general public. The exam should be in addition to, or in conjunction with, the issuance of a valid health certificate as required in the Operations Manual for canine deployment.

ATTACHMENTS

- Attachment A A single page veterinary exam which attests that the canine appears free of infectious disease or physical abnormality that would endanger the animal, other animals or the general public. The exam parameters allow for it to be completed quickly.
- Attachment B References for health certificate options.

PROGRAM IMPACTS / DOCUMENTATION CHANGES

- Costs may be submitted for approval as part of a deployment reimbursement claim. If a Task Force has been activated, a vet exam is reimbursable. If a Task Force has not been activated at the time an exam is conducted, the expense will not be reimbursable unless the Task Force is subsequently activated.
- Task Forces may arrange for a veterinarian to be on call for this service around the clock, ensuring that the deployment window can be met. Alternatively, handlers may be requested to provide documentation of an exam which attests that the canine appears free of infectious disease or physical abnormality that would endanger the animal, other animals or the general public and conducted no more than 10 days prior to a deployment by a licensed DVM.

FINANCIAL IMPACT TO TASK FORCES

■ Reimbursable deployment expense – costs vary according to the individual Task Force agreements (or handler agreements) with their respective veterinarian services. An average fee for this service is approximately \$50.00 per canine.

Attachment B

Health Certificate Options

(1) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection

Issued by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA). Generally accepted for domestic travel. May be completed by any licensed veterinarian. http://www.avma.org/issues/policy/inspection_certificates.pdf

(2) APHIS Form 7001

Issued by Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and the US Department of Agriculture (USDA). Universally accepted for domestic as well as international travel. Any licensed veterinarian may use this form, but for international travel the veterinarian must be USDA certified.

(3) Individual States

Each individual state has its own specific health certificate requirements. Veterinarians may acquire the forms through their state office. These certificates do not ensure that the canine will be in compliance with a different state's requirements.
